Unit 5:2 Film Study: Finding Forrester

The film Finding Forrester is the first installment in examining the final exam essay topic that you will write in class on your final exam day(s). Recall that the topic title is "Knowledge: What is it Good for?" The writer of Ecclesiastes (attributed to Solomon, who is said to be the wisest man who ever lived) writes that "In wisdom there is much grief, and increasing knowledge results in increasing pain." It seems that with increased knowledge comes the increased pain of responsibility. This seems to be the problem. But is it a problem? Essentially the final exam essay will have you explore this issue for the characters in the stories and for you, yourself. On this sheet of paper, take notes on the price of increasing knowledge for the characters Jamal Wallace and William Forrester. This will be submitted the day you complete the film, at which point you should have at least three (3) solid insights in each of the four boxes. An example of a solid insight has been done for you. Do not just copy these from a "friend"; you'll both lose credit.

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Notable quotations from the movie, in no particular order:

1. William Forrester: You write the first draft with your heart and the second draft with your head.
