9:1a Reflexive Verbs

Reflexive verbs are the verbs that end in -ARSE/ -ERSE/ -IRSE (*llamarse, sorprenderse, aburrirse*).

To conjugate a reflexive verb:

- Take the reflexive ending *se* and put it **before the verb**
- Conjugate it choosing from *me, te, se, nos, os, se*
- Drop the ending –AR/ -ER/ -IR of the verb
- Conjugate the verb as you normally would

Examples:

<u>Ducharse</u>: me ducho, te duchas, se ducha, nos duchamos, os ducháis, se duchan <u>Ponerse:</u> me pongo, te pones, se pone, nos ponemos, os ponéis, se ponen

9:1b Reflexive Verbs

Reflexive pronouns must be memorized:

ME	NOS
TE	OS
SE	SE

Usually, reflexive verbs are used when the action goes back to the subject.

Afeitarse – to shave (oneself);

Ducharse – to take a shower;

Levantarse – to get up

However, there are many other uses of reflexive verbs (that will be studied later).

Reflexive verbs are usually translated into English as an expression, not as one word.

Enojarse – to become angry;

Sentarse – to sit down;

Llamarse – to be called (named).

The most common reflexive verbs must be memorized.
